Subject:	By-law to prescribe lower rates of speed within the Town of Grand Valley – Main Street North and South

Recommendation

THAT Council receive Report – By-law to prescribe lower rates of speed within the Town of Grand Valley – Main Street North and South,

AND FURTHER THAT Council approves the by-law as presented and directs staff to prepare and present the by-law for passing.

Executive Summary

Purpose

To present a by-law to prescribe a 40 kilometre per hour speed limit on Main Street, North and South, in Grand Valley

Key Findings

The original speed limit by-law for this stretch of road contained references to time limits. No other by-law had been passed to remove those time limits. By-law to prescribe lower rates of speed within the Town of Grand Valley – Main Street

Report

Background

Grand Valley is posting an automated speed enforcement camera in front of the elementary school on Main Street North. In order to prepare for the camera's activation, the Town is to provide an evidence package, supporting our preparation for the deployment of this tool. Included in this package is to be photographs of the required signage, sample camera shots from the new camera, and all the by-laws supporting the enforcement program, including the Community Safety Zone by-laws and the applicable speed limit by-laws.

Discussion

Upon review of the Town's various speed limiting by-laws, it was discovered that there is no by-law explicitly enforcing a 40 kilometre per hour limit between William Street and the elementary school, and the current by-law to lower the speed in front of the school only provides for a speed reduction during school hours (see Attachment 1 – By-law 1996-18). Town signs posted along our roads reflect a 40 kilometre per hour limit on Main Street and Water Street through the length of the urban area. However, existing by-laws only provide for this limit along Water Street, from Melody Lane to William Street, and then in front of the school.

A by-law to correct this oversight is attached to this report as Attachment 2. If this new bylaw is passed, the by-law from 1996 will be repealed and replaced with this new by-law. Speed Enforcement Tickets that have been issued in accordance with 1996-18 will still be valid.

If Council approves and passes the new by-law, it will be included in the evidence package for the automated speed enforcement program. If Council decides to keep the existing by-law, the automated speed enforcement program will only be able to operate between the hours prescribed in the by-law (8:00am – 4:00pm, on school days), as the

camera is not set up to accommodate varied speed limits, and street signage will need to be corrected.
